IMD World Competitiveness Yearbook 2025 Launch

Theme: From Insight to Action: Strengthening National Competitiveness

As we conclude today's programme, allow me to express my deep gratitude—for your presence, your engagement, and most importantly, your commitment to the hard, necessary work of rebuilding South Africa's competitiveness.

The 2025 IMD World Competitiveness Yearbook results have been laid bare. South Africa now ranks 64th out of 69 countries. This is a sobering reflection of the deep structural challenges we face across government, business, infrastructure, and our economy at large.

But this is not a moment to retreat. It is a moment to reflect, to reset, and to rally. These results are not a verdict—they are a diagnosis. And like all good diagnoses, they point us to where the healing must begin.

 That means embedding productivity improvement into industrial policy, public sector performance, and enterprise support frameworks.
- We must strengthen public-private collaboration.
 Competitiveness is not the job of government alone. We need inclusive dialogue and co-creation between business, labour, and the state to identify real bottlenecks and practical solutions.

3. We must empower enterprises—especially SMMEs—with tools, knowledge, and systems to thrive.

Productivity is built at the ground level—on factory floors, in offices, in public institutions. That's where transformation happens. And that's where Productivity SA is already making a difference.

As the Deputy Minister rightly highlighted, Productivity SA's role is not only technical—it is strategic. It is national. It is catalytic.

We welcome government's continued support, and we are committed to:

- Scaling productivity programmes across more sectors and provinces
- Informing economic and employment policy through robust research and data
- And strengthening our partnerships to drive impact where it matters most

Let us not see this launch as the end of a process—but as the beginning of a new commitment. A commitment to action, to accountability, and to inclusive growth.

The journey ahead will not be easy. But it is necessary. And if we move forward together—with honesty, urgency, and shared purpose—we can turn these insights into impact.
